

By now you have read or heard through the news media or watching one of our council meetings that effective August 1st, all of the Kenton County cities except Elsmere and Erlanger have gone with the Kenton County 911 dispatch center. While you will notice no change when dialing 911, please note that our 24 hour non-emergency number did change to 859-356-3191. Our own police number is still the same 331-5911.

The county has advised us that the \$85 dollar parcel fee on last year's tax bills will now be lowered to a \$60 dollar parcel fee. Our city has again frozen this year's tax rate for the 2013-2014 year, as we have for the last 6 years with no increase.

The July 4th 5K race of 1080 runners and walkers was our largest group we have ever had. Thanks to you all for coming out and enjoying a healthy morning. The weather did put a damper on the parade and the neighborhood cookouts, but we still were able to get the fireworks off, just before

As of August 14th, the Dudley Road easements from Winding Trails to Madison Pike (3L) have been delivered to District 6 DOT office with the hope of a quick answer to when we can go out to bid on the Dudley Hill construction project. Once we are approved we can proceed.

Within the last few weeks the highway department has changed the turning arrows at the following intersections, Dudley and Turkeyfoot and Barnwood and Turkeyfoot to a flashing yellow arrow after the light has cycled from red to green. This flashing arrow is to make us aware to proceed with caution while turning at those intersections.

Recycling is still a hot topic and many residents are finding that their recycle bins are filling up sooner than their standard garbage bins. So keep up the recycling, it's showing it does work and it is saving the landfills.

Two reminders, one is that our city does not have an Insurance Premium tax and if your insurance bill does reflect this tax please call your agent and advise that we do not have this tax and they will correct their error. Secondly, our police department does have a medical drop off box for those who need to dispose of expired or no longer needed prescriptions.

On August 19th, our city administrator Douglas Beckham was seriously injured in a car accident on his way home. Please remember him in your thoughts and pray for a speedy recovery.

Fireman Mike Says...



Hope everyone survived the heat this summer. Fall weather is just around the corner thankfully. And of course fall means October which is Fire Prevention Month. This year's theme is "Prevent Kitchen Fires." They say the kitchen is the heart of the home, but it's also the #1 site of home fires and home fire injuries.

So let's get cooking with Fire Safety! During the month of October, the Edgewood Fire Department will be doing programs to enhance these prevention efforts. One of the events will be our Open House on Sunday, October 6th from 11 – 2 at the fire station. We will have lots of things for the kids to do including a large fire truck inflatable! So please save the date and join in on the fun activities planned. Also during the month of October we will have Fire Station Tours, School Visits to the classrooms, and visits to Day Cares. We will also be promoting efforts to Stamp Out Fire Hazards, the importance of Smoke Detectors, planning ahead for a Safe Escape, and of course Preventing Kitchen Fires. We are going to ask each child during the school visits to do a home inspection, so parents be ready to assist them. Plan now to help us continue to keep Edgewood a safe place to live.

A few more tips for the fall: 1. Watch Those Flames. Never leave burning candles or open flames unattended for any period of time.

2. Climb with Care. When using ladders to clean gutters or decorate, check the rungs, make sure the ladder is securely placed, and don't overdo the angle when propping it against your home. 3. Keep it to Treats, No Tricks. Keep the scariest night of the year fun by purchasing flame retardant costumes and teaching your kids about Halloween safety. 4. Be Alarmed. Make sure that you have smoke alarms on each floor of your home, test them weekly and change the batteries twice a year.
