By the time this newsletter reaches your doorstep, the road slippage on Horsebranch should be completed. The work was to repair a landslide along the creek that was encroaching the pavement. This should correct the problem for years to come. Thanks for your patience during this construction period.

Our other major road work will be at the entrance of Lawrence Drive and down Dudley where SD1 will be installing larger drain pipes to improve water flow in that area. Temporary traffic lights are in place to help move the traffic since it will be down to one lane during construction. There will be delays until the work is completed. We are recommending alternate routes such as Thomas More Parkway to get you to Turkeyfoot and Dixie Highway. Reach alert at www.reachalert.com is still activated for you to be notified of emergencies, recreation events, crime alerts, road closures, and any other city related announcements. This service is free, so please try it out if you have not already.

Just another reminder that the City of Edgewood does not have an insurance premium tax on Auto, Health, and/or Property. If you notice any of these taxes on your insurance bill you need to contact your agent and advise them, we do not have those. They should make necessary adjustments to your policy.

Edge of the Woods Garden Club

Who hasn't chased a firefly on a warm summer night? For many of us, this is the true beginning of summer.

These bioluminescent organisms are not really "flies" – they are beetles! They get the name "firefly" and "lightening bug" because of the flashes of light they naturally produce, especially during mating season to attract the ideal mate. Fireflies have immense biological and economic importance and are very much a part of our natural ecosystem. The disruption or decline in this species is only too close to home as more land and our historical farms and woods diminish to make room for more homes and businesses. The basic threats to fireflies are: *habitat degradation and loss; * Light pollution; *Pesticide use; *Scarcity of water; * Invasive species; and * Overall collection.

Fireflies may be most vulnerable during their larval state, which lasts up to 2 years. Fireflies play an important role in the ecosystem as both predators and prey. The larvae are voracious carnivores that feed on soft-bodied invertebrates such as slugs, worms, and snails. This is beneficial to our gardens as they help control the population of slugs and snails that feed on our vegetables and flowers. The fireflies

store up all the fuel during the larvae stage that they will need for their entire adult lives – only 2-4 weeks. What can we do to help to ensure our grandchildren will have the same joy of chasing fireflies?

Let's keep the ecosystem in balance, and our childhood memories alive...

- Provide safe places to over-winter such as trees, leaf litter and underground burrows
- Clean water source or moisture
- Reduce or avoid insecticides
- Dark nights turn out unnecessary lights
- Native vegetation of varying heights

YOU ARE THE BEST WITNESS!

School is back in session and summer has left, the time for vacations is winding down. We would like to provide a few reminders of how you can help continue to make the City of Edgewood the greatest city ever. We need your eyes and ears to report criminal activity in your neighborhood. Remember, the Edgewood Police are on duty 24/7. We can respond to a call whether it is 12 noon or 2 in the morning. If you see something that seems out of place, it is completely appropriate to call when it is happening. This provides us the opportunity to resolve the situation so that it may not happen again. If you have the opportunity and you can remain safe doing so, please take a picture, save your doorbell or outside camera video and stay on the phone with Kenton County Dispatch so that we can get real time information. The number to our dispatch is **859-356-3191**, you can call that number anytime you see a problem, or simply dial 911 for any emergency. Please, **DO NOT** attempt to approach an unknown person possibly committing a crime, this is very dangerous and could make things worse.

Another reminder is to keep your houses and vehicles locked at all times when not in use. Keep all valuables out of sight. It only takes a moment for the criminal to check your doors and gain access to your vehicle while you are sleeping. Consider using a motion sensor light and possibly a camera attached to that light to capture anyone attempting to gain access to your vehicle overnight.

If something happens to you, please call us. Whether something is stolen or not, it will help us develop the trends to report them to others.

Hope everyone enjoyed their summer. Fall weather is just around the corner. And of course, fall means October which is Fire Prevention Month. This year's theme is "Cooking safety starts with YOU. Pay attention to fire prevention". Did you know? Cooking fires are the leading cause of home fires and home fire injuries. Unattended cooking is the leading cause of

What can you do? The good news is you can prevent most cooking fires and burns. Help keep your family safer with some simple but effective tips.

During the month of October, the Edgewood Fire Department will be doing programs to enhance these prevention efforts. One of the events will be our Annual 'Touch-A-Truck' in conjunction with our city's Police Department and General Services Department, this will be October 7th, 12pm–2pm. We will have lots of things for the kids to do including a petting zoo and balloon animals! So please save the date and join in on the fun activities planned. Also, during the month of October, we will have Fire Station Tours, School Visits to the classrooms, and visits to Day Cares.

Lastly, fall is the season when the fire department responds to 911 calls regarding camp fires. As a reminder, open burning is prohibited within the city limits of Edgewood. Permissible fires are those fires that include candles, torches, grills, and ceremonial fires that are burned in an area no greater than three (3) square feet. These fires must also be in an enclosed metal container or surrounded by noncombustible materials, such as stone. All fires should not be left unattended and is recommended that a hose connected to a water source or other appropriately sized extinguisher be present. During extreme weather conditions, this regulation may be superseded by a higher governmental authority.
