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
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AWESOME ANIMAL ADAPTATIONS

i HAVE AN ELECTRIC MOTOR SCOOTER. WHERE CAN I RIDE IT?



The City of Edgewood is a great place to live and enjoy. It is important that some rules are made to help ensure that all have the same opportunity to enjoy all aspects of our city. When it comes to a motorized vehicle like a scooter, there is an inherent caution that must be observed. How do I know the rules? First of all, we will look at the Commonwealths rules, called Kentucky Revised Statutes (K.R.S.) and then we will narrow that down to how it applies to Edgewood through our own local Ordinances.

When it comes to Powered Electric Motor Scooters (Electric Scooters), K.R.S. 189.289 is the specific law for the Commonwealth. It states the following, in short:

- 1) You must be 16 years old or older to operate an electric scooter on a roadway or bike lane.
- **2)** You must follow all traffic laws, i.e. stop signs, (found in K.R.S. 189.520).
- 3) You must have a headlamp in front and a red tail light in back, which must be used ½ hour after sunset to ½ hour before sunrise as well as anytime it is hard to see or rainy.
- **4)** It can be parked on the sidewalk as long as it is out of the way of pedestrians. K.R.S. does not limit the Electric Scooter to the roadway, it can be ridden on the sidewalk. See the next paragraph for the Edgewood City Ordinance for sidewalk rules.

The City of Edgewood local Ordinance 73.02 specifically governs the use of Electric Scooters and allows them to be driven on the street and on the sidewalks as long as they meet the qualifications outlined in K.R.S. 189.289 above and include the following:

- 1) You must have at least 1 hand on the handlebar.
- 2) You must yield right of way to all pedestrians and are extra careful.
- 3) Use the scooter in the manner in which it was intended for safe use.
- 4) The rider must verbally or otherwise warn a pedestrian before passing.
- **5)** You must pass on the left side of the pedestrian in the same direction.
- **6)** When crossing a street, you must: step off the scooter and cross straight across as to not remain on the street (preferably at a cross walk and looking both directions for any vehicle). Remember that the pedestrians have the right of way on the sidewalks.

In reference to small motorcycles and mopeds, they may not be ridden on the sidewalks and must adhere to the laws governing traffic codes. Any travel on the roadways would be governed by K.R.S. 189.520 and the operator must have a valid operator license. Please see Edgewood Ordinance 73.02 (C).

Across the street from 109 Dudley Road, an empty field now. Upon completion the new civic center was to be used by the Civic Association, Town Trustees, Edgewood Homemakers and others. The article goes on to mention a few of the volunteers such as: Charles Hesselman, George Brady, Howard Wilson, William Jeffery, John Sowle, Herbert Williams, J.G. Wilde, Ralph Thornton, Russell Bezold, Ed Schrand, Harold Borne, Max Lenhard, Everett Freeman, William Whitson, Thomas Ertel, Bob Thornton, Len and Rupert Adick, Ed Reynolds, Herman Brown, Carl Foltz and A.P. Fall in Love With a Fall Garden!

Although summer is waning and vegetable gardens may be looking drab, take heart! If you haven't done so already, fall in Love with Fall gardening. Leafy vegetables such as spinach, kale, lettuces, arugula and Swiss Chard are excellent cool weather crops and come in lots of varieties. Collard greens, mustard greens, and Bok choy, are also great to grow in the fall. These and a variety of root vegetables, such as beets, turnips, carrots are excellent for making those hearty soups and stews that are welcome with the cooler autumn temperature. Growing

leafy greens and root vegetables require only around six hours of sun per day and should be planted in well-drained loamy soil for the best results. Another fall favorite is sugar snap peas. These vining plants are easy to grow and very rewarding! All of the plants below can be started by seed in your outdoor garden. Leafy greens should be harvested starting from the outside leaves and leaving the center to continue to grow. If you don't fall in love with these Fall plants, at least they will warm your belly on those cooler autumn or winter nights.

Fireman Mark Says... by Firefighter Mark Messmer

Hope everyone enjoyed their summer. Fall weather is just around the corner. And of course, fall means October which is Fire Prevention Month. This year's theme is "Smoke alarms: Make them work for you!".

Did you know?

- Roughly three out of five fire deaths happen in homes with either no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.
- More than one-third (38 percent) of home fire deaths result from fires in which no smoke alarms are present.
- The risk of dying in a home fire is cut in half in homes with working smoke alarms.

What can you do?

- Install smoke alarms in every sleeping room and outside each separate sleeping area. Install
 alarms on every level of the home. Install alarms in the basement.
- It is best to use interconnected smoke alarms so that when one smoke alarm sounds, they all sound.
- Test all smoke alarms at least once a month. Press the test button to be sure the alarm is working.

- A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire.
- Working smoke alarms are an important part of a home fire escape plan.

During the month of October, the Edgewood Fire Department will be doing programs to enhance these prevention efforts. One of the events will be our Annual 'Touch-A-Truck' in conjunction with our city's Police Department and General Services Departments, this will be October 5th, 12pm-2pm. Please save the date and join in on the fun activities planned. Also, during the month of October we will have Fire Station Tours, School Visits to the classrooms, and visits to Day Cares.

Lastly, fall is the season when the fire department responds to 911 calls regarding camp fires. As a reminder, open burning is prohibited within the city limits of Edgewood. Permissible fires are those fires that include candles, torches, grills, and ceremonial fires that are burned in an area no greater than three (3) square feet. These fires must also be in an enclosed metal container or surrounded by noncombustible materials, such as stone. No fire should not be left unattended and is recommended that a hose connected to a water source or other appropriately sized extinguisher be present. During extreme weather conditions, this regulation may be superseded by a higher governmental authority.
